NEWS FROM CLIFTON CHURCHES

HISTORY CORNER

You start a bit of DIY and the job just grows ... especially with an old house. Preparing to redecorate one room in January, we ended up replastering, replacing a rotted lintel over the window and repairing loose stones in the wall. The real shock came after using a hammer to tap a small, loose stone back into place with some fresh lime mortar. A section of the wall collapsed and bits of brick and dust spilled out, leaving more loose material that needed to be removed before the wall could be rebuilt. Something that looked like a piece of wood would have to come out too. This turned out to be the remains of a clog: wooden sole, leather upper with lace holes, and an iron heel cleat! Thankfully nothing else was hidden in what was a cavity within the thickness of the wall. Apparently putting footwear (or other things) within the structure of a building is a widespread phenomenon. The reasons for it are hazy, however. It might bring

good luck or fertility, or ward off evil.
The Little Clifton 2023 concealed clog discovery has been added to the Concealed Shoe Index that is kept by
Northampton Museum.
The Curator identified the clog as dating back to the late 1800s, which would be roughly when the building was converted into a dwelling from a

NATURE CORNER



Elephant Hawk Moths have been seen in several gardens this month – these spectacular moths feed at night on nectar from the flowers of honeysuckle and other tubular flowers. The caterpillars, which have huge 'eye' spots to deter predators, feed on willowherbs, enchanter's nightshade, Himalayan balsam and fuchsias, and overwinter as pupae in fragile cocoons at the base of plants in loose plant debris/litter, or just below the surface of the ground.



TRAFFIC ISSUES

Recently, there have been discussions at Parish Council meetings over the issue of traffic speed in the village. It is the opinion of some residents that the existing speed limit should be lowered.

Currently, the situation is that a 30mph limit is in force from the high point on Oldfield Road down into the centre of Bridgefoot. In Bridgefoot itself, the 30mph limit extends from Chapel Brow (opposite the first house) to a point just past the old railway bridge (near Station Terrace), where it then becomes a 40mph limit up to the junction just past Marron Lane.

The issues:

• High volumes of HGVs, particularly trucks from Tendley Quarry, constitute a hazard to pedestrians, especially given the lack of pavement in some areas. The danger from fastmoving vehicles discourages people from walking short distances within the village. This makes people more likely to take to their cars thus

increasing the amount of vehicular traffic.

- Speeding vehicles constitute a danger to cyclists, for example when travelling over the old railway bridge and turning right into Station Terrace or when passing parked cars on Chapel Terrace.
- HGVs travelling at speed appear to be causing vibration damage to buildings and bridges.
- Residents exiting in vehicles from side entrances are put at greater danger from through-traffic travelling at speed. This is especially true for the residents of Marron Lane, where the sight-lines are poor and through-traffic vehicles are routinely accelerating to well over the current speed limit.
- Vehicles travelling at 30mph very close to house entrances where there is no pavement pose a serious risk. In the case of two houses within the village, the limit is 40mph and the lack of pavement results in 40 ton trucks passing within a hair's breadth of the residents' front door.

 Vehicles have been regularly observed exceeding speed limits.

The Parish Council would like to know the views of Bridgefoot and Little Clifton residents on this issue

- 1. Do you want to see the speed limits lowered?
- 2. Do you have an opinion on where the speed limit boundaries should be fixed?
- 3. Do you have any thoughts on deploying traffic calming measures? Eg Traffic lights, speed cameras, speed bumps, chicanes (setting up artificial bends or obstacles to slow traffic, as in the entrance to Kirkland).
