HISTORY CORNER

Bridgefoot railway station was built by the Whitehaven, Cleator and Egremont Railway and opened in 1866. The line was taken over by LNWR in 1879, carrying goods and minerals between Whitehaven, Cleator, Egremont and Workington. Passenger traffic consisted of three trains a day in each direction, with an extra on Whitehaven market day and none on Sundays. The station was sited below the main road bridge, at the end of Station Terrace, it was closed in April 1931 when normal passenger traffic ended along the line. Goods trains continued to pass through the station until 1954.

NATURE CORNER

Un-tidying your garden this autumn

Autumn is traditionally the time for tidying the garden before winter, but does it really need doing?

Martyn Beardsall of Valley View has this advice...

In any subconscious cost/benefit analysis, tidying in the garden for the sake of it rarely scores highly enough make it necessary. Nature loves an untidy autumn; everything that has flowered is setting seed and fruit. Those seeds are vital food resources for all types of animals, from birds to invertebrates, and the decomposing remains of plants are great habitat for insects, small mammals, reptiles and amphibians. Leaving soil bare over the winter is recognised as a bad practice. Digging it

Leaving soil bare over the winter is recognised as a bad practice. Digging it over for the winter is detrimental for the soil's structure and microbiome, reducing fertility and interrupting the granular structure of the soil, reducing drainage and water infiltration rates so that bare soils are leached of their nitrogen, further

reducing fertility for the coming season.

If you really want to clear your garden, you could try to "chop and drop" leaving plant material where you cut it. It can block weed seed germination and will decompose in situ as detritivores return nutrients to the soil. Mulching is another strategy to protect the soil and increase fertility, any remains can be scraped off in the spring just before planting. Thatchy grass and garden litter under bushes and hedges are prime habitats and hibernating spots for a variety of invertebrate species, this is what the blackbird is looking for in February.

Retrofit made easy – free thermal imaging



Retrofit is the introduction of new materials, products and technologies into an existing building to reduce the energy needed to live in your home.

Retrofitting your home improves temperatures and ventilation, reducing stale, damp air and the related issues of mould. air-borne toxins and excessive moisture levels, which can all negatively affect people and property. It gives residents a healthier, more comfortable living environment, which is beneficial for a variety of health issues from skin and respiratory problems, to arthritis, circulation problems and many other conditions exacerbated by cold and damp,

including mental wellbeing. Your home becomes cheaper to heat and reduces its carbon footprint.

In collaboration with CAfS (Cumbria Action for Sustainability) and local groups in Greysouthen, Eaglesfield and the Melbreak Communities, Little Clifton and **Bridgefoot Energy Hub** are taking part in Retrofit Made Easy, a project to help people make their homes more energy efficient. Local volunteers are going to be trained to use thermal imaging cameras so that, when the weather gets colder, residents can get free thermal imaging surveys. A thermal imaging survey can help identify cold spots in your home, highlighting draughts, missing and defective insulation, water ingress and cold bridges. You can use this information to take action.

TRAFFIC ISSUES

Many thanks to all those who took the time to reply to the article on traffic issues in the last Village News. There appears to be a broad consensus that fastmoving vehicles and HGVs are a concern to many residents. In addition, there was mention of parked cars which, in some parts of the village where there is no formal pavement, can make life difficult for pedestrians. **Proposed solutions** included solar-powered speed warning lights (as at Brigham School) rumble strips and chicanes. The majority were in favour of a lowering of the speed limits from 30mph to 20mph in the villages themselves, and extending speed limits out as far as the Greysouthen turn-off. Speed bumps and traffic lights were thought to be a step too far.

Cumberland Council are more likely to support a lowering of the speed limit within the villages if there is enough support from the community.

Jen says that the bus company has informed her that if an X5 is cancelled, then the **FOLLOWING X4** bus MUST service the villages ... if the driver refuses he should be

politely requested to phone the depot for confirmation. It seems that some drivers are not being made aware of this 'rule' by their inspectors, so some persistence may be necessary; only insist if you know for definite that the previous X5 didn't arrive.
