### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

#### Village Hall Committee Update

Over the past few months the Village Hall Committee has been working with ACTion with Communities in Cumbria to apply for Lottery funds to cover the costs of installing solar panels on the roof of the Village Hall, together with battery storage inside the Hall and additional insulation.

The Lottery has now awarded us £32,915 for these improvements, so the Hall can look forward to a more energy efficient future.

Some years ago a hedge was planted behind the Village Hall for the purpose of screening. This has grown very tall and, as part of the project, the height of the hedge is to be taken down so that it becomes more manageable. In addition there are some diseased ash trees in the car park and these will be taken down. Just near the bench there is an oak tree which is estimated to be about 40 years old... some of you may be able say precisely how old it is! Currently this oak is being cramped by a couple of other trees and these will be removed to enable the oak tree to flourish.

The contractor tasked with the arboreal work intends to cut the tree trunks into manageable lengths which can then be taken away for firewood. As we know a number of people have wood burning stoves, we would like to make the distribution of this timber as fair as possible. With that in mind, if you would like some of the timber then please drop a note into the post-box inside the gates at the Village Hall with your name and telephone number. The timber is just for those in the village please. If there is any over then those who've applied will be able to take more.

### HISTORY CORNER

#### **Little Clifton Village Hall**

The first Village Hall was a wooden, army surplus hut, acquired after WW2. Locals can still remember WI meetings, Bingo and dancing to Billy Bowman's Bijou Band. In the mid-1970s the hut was condemned by the local authority, allegedly whilst a children's party was in full swing! The children were evacuated and the doors nailed shut...

In 1977, following a meeting of residents, plans for a replacement hall were drawn up. Various money-raising events were held, including the sale of homemade treacle toffee, pie and pea suppers in the Mission Rooms at Gt Clifton, prize bingo in residents' homes, and a night out at the Rendezvous Night

Club in Workington with chicken-in-a basket supper and a celebrity singer! All three pubs in the Parish (the Horseshoe & Sickle, the Duke's Head, and the Greyhound) had buckets and jars on the bar for any loose change, and arranged both darts and domino competitions.

The new hall was built over a period of three years by Tommy Birkett (sadly deceased, though family members still live at Chapel Brow) with labouring help from local folk. Today the Village Hall is used regularly by a variety of groups, including a camera club, patchwork group, Cockermouth U3A Ukelele Group, art classes, t'ai chi lessons, St Luke's Church and the Parish Council.

### NATURE CORNER



It's been hard to miss the skeins of geese that have been flying over the villages since late October, their haunting calls causing even the busiest of us to stop and look skywards. Large flocks of Greylag geese have been feeding in the local area; the birds have come from Iceland to spend the winter here, they will return home in spring to breed in the short summer months.

The wild greylag goose is the ancestor of most domesticated, farmyard geese. It was traditionally eaten at Michaelmas (the 29th September: a day for celebrating the archangel St. Michael), and was cooked with port and mustard. Greylag geese have short bills and prefer to graze pasture, though they will also take grain, root crops and leafy vegetation.

A record number of 22 people turned out on 5<sup>th</sup> November for the latest village litter-pick. A goodly amount of rubbish was collected from within the village and out towards Gt Clifton and Greysouthen. We then adjourned to the Village Hall for coffee and cakes; many thanks to all who took part.

Retrofit made easy – free thermal imaging

In collaboration with CAfS (Cumbria Action for Sustainability) and local groups in Greysouthen, Eaglesfield and the Melbreak Communities, Little Clifton and **Bridgefoot Energy Hub** are taking part in Retrofit Made Easy, a project to help people make their homes more energy efficient. Local volunteers are now trained to use thermal imaging cameras so that, now the weather is colder, you can get a free thermal imaging survey. A thermal imaging survey

can help identify cold spots in your home, highlighting draughts, missing and defective insulation, water ingress and cold bridges. You can use this information to take action.
