Change of time and venue

From the small green shoots of the pilot scheme at Bridgefoot Village Hall, FareShare foodsharing has become an established part of Sunday afternoon. A local community group, Friends of Bridgefoot and Little Clifton, has been formed to put the running of the foodshare scheme, now called Village Larder, onto a more formal footing.

The Village Larder, as it now is, will run for now on a Friday afternoon from 3:00 until 5:00pm, at Great Clifton village hall.

Anyone who wants to collect food pays an annual membership fee of just £1. Members may then come along and pay a small contribution to collect some of what is available on the day.

HISTORY CORNER



Thanks to Carol Elliott for spotting that the wall protecting the 'new' graveyard of St Luke's Church is 100 years old this year. It was presented to the church by W.H. and M. Richmond of Clifton Hall, Gt. Clifton in 1924. Although the site of St Luke's dates back to Norman times, the current church was built around 1901. The surrounding graveyard is much older, with one of the oldest graves, that of Mary Anne Jackson, dated 1784.

There are four war-graves in the cemetery – Eric McFarland, age 22, a Flying Officer with the RAF Reserve regiment, John Hodgson, a Royal Navy stoker, Edward Armstrong Brown, age

26, a Private in the
Border Regiment, and
Alan Everard Dixon,
Leading Aircraftman in
the RAF Volunteer
Reserve, age just 19.
The churchyard also
contains several mighty
Irish yew trees, which are
worth a visit in their own
right.

Future of Clifton Church

The Church Warden and PCC of St Luke's Church Clifton would like to invite residents of Great and Little Clifton and other interested parties to an open consultation about the future of the church, to be held on Wednesday 25th September at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall.

St Luke's Church has had a long and faithful history. Although the present building dates from only 1901 we think that worship has been offered on that site from around 1080. The church remains in demand for baptisms, weddings and funerals and many villagers have family members laid to rest in its peaceful

churchyard. We work in partnership with Great Clifton Methodist Church and we also have a warm relationship with Derwent Vale School, bringing the good news of our Lord Jesus Christ to a new generation of children. However, the present congregation is now smaller and older and can no longer sustain all the responsibilities of maintaining the church and its life on our own. We have reached the point of needing to make some important decisions about the future.

To help us do this in a way that serves the best interests of our village community we need to hear your views and ideas so do come along and have your say. The meeting will be chaired by Archdeacon Stewart Fyfe and he and members of the PCC will help us to explore possible next steps. NATURE NOTES

Regular passers-by will have noticed a transformation in the front garden of one of the houses in Sycamore Garth facing the main road. With help from family and friends, Nicola Roguski has built a garden pond, complete with water and marginal plants and a rockery (see photos on page 1). The new pond contrasts sharply with the traditional idea of a front garden, and will be of much greater value to wildlife that the lawn it replaced, providing drinking and bathing water for birds, a home for frogs and other amphibians, and encouraging butterflies and other insects to visit.

COOKERY CORNER

Villagers at the Litter Pick in April were treated to coffee and cake after their hard work. Here is Fiona's recipe for Boiled Fruit Cake, adapted from a recipe by Delia Smith, and much praised by all who sampled it...

Ingredients: 110g raisins 225g chopped dates 285g sultanas
275g margarine
275ml water
1 large tin condensed
milk
150g plain flour
150g wholemeal flour
¾ teaspoon bicarbonate
of soda
A pinch of salt
1 generous tablespoon
chunky marmalade

Method:

Preheat oven to gas 3, 170C Place fruits, marg, water and condensed milk in a saucepan, bring to the boil and simmer for 3 minutes. Allow to cool, then stir in the flour, salt, bicarb and marmalade. Spoon the mixture into a prepared cake tin and bake for 2½ - 3 hours (cover lightly with a piece of greaseproof paper to prevent over-browning on the top).

Allow cake to cool for a few minutes before removing from tin onto a wire rack. The cake will keep well for several weeks, providing the litter pickers don't get to it first!
